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| April 16               | Storyboarding your plot (1) Whether you are a pantser or a plotter, this session will help you develop your storyline, ensuring it meets genre expectations and providing you with an outline that prevents the story from stalling and being relegated to the bottom drawer. | 23 <sup>rd</sup> April | Marketing your book (1) The success of any book is in direct relation to its promotional campaign. If you have a book that should be in the public eye, this three-hour session is for you. Topics covered: Pre-launch promotions, the Book Launch, getting a following; Keeping your book in the public's eye; social media; book trailers; author talks, printed material. | May 7 and 14           | Writing the Ordinary (2) When writing, initially allow your ideas to flow without concern for punctuation, paragraphing, or word choice. Permit free expression – then review and revise to accurately convey your intended message. In this class, we will leverage your preferred genre to explore methods for enhancing your writing through a series of exercises and the self-editing process. Self-editing is a critical skill for any writer and knowing what to look for can significantly improve the quality of your work. | May 21 and 28          | Public Speaking (2) This short course covers the delivery skills needed to engage and entertain an audience, whether it be for author talks, launching a book, pitching to a publisher or delivering a speech. | June 4 and 11          | Word for Writers (2) – Computer Skills Part 1  This short course covers the various features of Word (for Windows) that writers need to know when preparing a clean text document for submission to competitions, book designers or publishers.
